The 125+2 Anniversary Weekend

WHHS SHINES!

The vision was grand, to plan a weekend where alumni, spanning the decades, could come together to commemorate their collective contributions to the rich Walnut Hills High School legacy. Though sidetracked by a global pandemic, on September 30 & October 1 & 2, 2022 alumni were finally able to celebrate a remarkable achievement, 125+2 years of excellence.

This theme served as the umbrella under which the WHHS Alumni Foundation designed an extraordinary alumni weekend that provided a plethora of opportunities to experience WHHS. As anticipation and enthusiasm grew, so did the number of classes who wanted to participate! Ten reunions joined the festivities—dinners, lunches, brunches, museum tours, you name it, they celebrated their WHHS friendships and legacy. The concept resonated with hundreds of Eagles who found their way home to engage firsthand in this WHHS experience.

Friday evening kicked off our first official event with the 125th+2 Anniversary Celebration Concert in the main auditorium featuring the WHHS+2 Alumni

Symphony Orchestra, Chamber Orchestra, Vocal Ensemble and Wind Performers. The concert featured works including compositions by Massenet, Morricone, Orff, Rimsky-Korsakov and Mozart.

The concert began with the inaugural performance by the WHHS Alumni Symphony Orchestra with an arrangement of Beethoven's *Ode to Joy* from his 9th and final symphony. Sixty

alumni, spanning from the Class of 1971 to the Class of 2022, joined us from near and far. One piece by Karl Jenkins, featured alumus, **Myles Yeazell '16** on cello and the Vocal Ensemble.

Current award winning soprano, **Ella Vaughn '23**, was featured in a selection from Carl Orff's *Carmina Burana*. In Jules Massenet's *Meditation from Thais*, **Maggie Vonderschmidt '23** was featured as the violin soloist. A resounding "Bravo" was heard by our guests totaling over 500. A dessert reception followed and based on the comments overheard in the crowd, you would have thought we had just left Carnegie Hall!

Saturday during the day at WHHS, featured student lead tours, a performance of *MacBeth*, demonstrations including our Robotic Team, a student panel discussion, lecturers featuring **Tom Gold '66**, a China scholar, with *What's Up with China* and **Laura McGill**, our AP Art History teacher leading a seminar of *Looking versus Seeing: Practice Art Historical Skills through the story of Judith and Holofernes*. Around the campus, one could observe music and athletic practices or visit our art showcase.

Saturday evening we continued the festivities at historic Music Hall. Guests were greeted in the lobby with cocktails and hors d' oeuvres

and then proceeded to the main ballroom. Blue and gold were reflected in the lighting along with a dome ceiling and pillars that mimicked the architecture of our alma mater. Former principal **Jeff Brokamp '78** joined **Dion Graham '79**, critically acclaimed actor and narrator, to serve as Masters of Ceremonies for the event. They were a perfect fit, each adding their own personalities and spin on every aspect of the program, besides qualifying for the WHHS GQ Society!

Prior to dinner being served, **Neil Bortz '50**, President of the WHHS Alumni Foundation since its inception in 1995, delivered a call to action reflecting on how far we have come but also our need and responsibility to sustain our legacy and the institution for future generations (Neil's remarks are reprinted on page 3). His unparalleled vision and leadership have guided our Board of Directors, an eclectic and diverse array of alumni talent, all dedicated to the WHHS Mission of excellence in education and opportunity to all.

Neil Bortz's 125+2 Gala Remarks

The 125+2 Anniversary Weekend continued from page 1

Twenty-five + two years ago we held a gala to celebrate our school's 100th anniversary. The response was overwhelming. We filled the Hall of Mirrors. Alumni came from all over. A few of us sat down several days later to "debrief". Recognizing the broad support at the gala, **Dr. Jerry Rauh '47** was bold enough to suggest we should try to raise \$50K to upgrade the 1932 Zoology Lab. Sounded like a lot to me and others, but **Glen Mayfield '59** thought we could do more.

So we engaged a professional fund raiser to test the waters. He interviewed over 70 of our alumni and was overwhelmed by their loyalty to WHHS. Without exception, all of them, from some of the country's most prestigious universities, said their commitment to Walnut was stronger than their commitment to their colleges!

As a result, twenty-seven years ago we started the WHHS Foundation with our first goal not to just raise \$50K for the Zoology Lab but \$13M to fund and build our Alumni Arts and Science Wing! First time that we know of anywhere in the country that the alumni raised such a significant amount of money for a public school.

The Foundation has since raised over \$40M for capital improvements such as the Christopher Athletic Field (its bleachers, concession stand, restrooms, lights and indoor batting cage building), our new natatorium (only pool in Cincinnati Public School System), the Tony Trabert Tennis Complex, environmental courtyards, weight room, the upgrading of the library and auditorium, the lighting of the dome and property acquisition to expand our campus.

Much of the money raised has gone to creating and supporting our college level engineering course, the writing center, the college information center, the innovation lab, text books, scientific and athletic equipment, musical instruments, our 92 athletic teams and clubs, college scholarships, and for professional development of our faculty & staff.

Perhaps most importantly, your Foundation has reached out to many of our students to provide money for many personal needs. 20% of our students are on the free lunch program and we found others living in their cars. The Foundation has helped change the lives of these students.

None of this would have been possible without your generous support and the hard work of Debbie and her staff.

But our work isn't done. Tonight we're excited to announce the kick-off of our \$50M campaign. \$7M will go to capital projects including the purchase of properties adjacent to the land the Foundation already owns on Johnathan Avenue to expand our campus for new enhancements, and a new amphitheater in the repurposed woods below our front door. The remaining \$43M will go to our endowment to support the continued efforts of our staff.

Tonight I'm pleased to report that we have already raised \$20M. I hope you all will join with us in helping raise the remaining \$30M with your gifts & your time. Together we can make the next 25 years of our school the best ever.

the centerpiece of each table, each reflecting an architectural element of the school and different flavor; they soon became a talking point of the evening.

Our current students performed songs from Broadway shows through the ages.

These stellar performances from alumni, faculty and current students brought down the house.

The evening ended with the WHHS Chamber Choir leading the Alma Mater with 400 Alum on their feet singing *High on the Hill*. Our motto, *Sursum ad Summum*, is still echoing in the Music Hall Ballroom. Truly a night to remember!

WHHS and Blink!

The Walnut Hills High School Family was thrilled to sponsor and participate in the 2022 BLINK Festival of Light and Art on October 13-16 from 7-11pm.

Blink is the nation's largest free outdoor public art event, spanning 30 city blocks and showcasing 101 installations. The experience included large scale projection installations, interactive light sculptures, murals, live entertainment and lots more including an amazing drone show over the Ohio River.

The WHHS family was well represented in leadership roles. **Andrew Salzbrun '03**, Managing Partner of Agar, was one of the Executive Partners for the event and **Colleen Stanton Houston '97**, Chief Executive Officer and Artistic Director of ArtWorks, was one of two producing partners. **The Carol Ann and Ralph V. Haile, Jr.' 40 Foundation** was the founding sponsor.

Over 1.3 Million people attended this event, setting a new record. It was a proud moment for the City of Cincinnati, definitely our crown jewel was lit for the occasion!

The Walnut Hills High School Drumline and Color Guard led the Opening Parade with over 2500 participants. Faculty members, parents and students in various groups were involved, including

Pneuhaus, an inflatable art studio from Rhode Island, co-founded by **Matt Mueller '10** and **Levi Bedall '10**, presented *Grove*, an immersive inflatable light sculpture which interactively changed colors and glowed in the dark. The Toy Heritage Mural celebrates the legacy of Kenner Toys (**Steiner Family**). Not to mention the rich history of WH students' artistic contribution to ArtWorks murals.

The entire WHHS Fine Arts Department participated in all four

evenings. Our dedicated performance space was located on Garfield Place. WH art students created various beautiful visual displays to augment the park setting. Our theater department designed and constructed colorful neon costumes for their abstract animal forms which made for wonderful performances. Several music groups performed each night—Chamber Orchestra, Choir, Steel Drums, Wind

New Class—Cybersecurity

As technology has become the center of global connectivity so has the need to invest in protecting private, corporate, and governmental information on a large scale. We want our students to be ahead on the cyber curve, therefore, Walnut has added a new elective offering to our curriculum for students who are interested in this field. Cybersecurity Course Description

The goal of this course is to earn a CompTIA Security+ certificate. CompTIA Security+ is a global certification that validates the baseline skills necessary to perform core security functions and pursue an IT security career.

Students will use industry-standard software called Skillssoft Percipio and TryHackMe to learn valuable Cybersecurity skills. Cybersecurity students start learning about hacking from the first day of class. In fact, students literally learn about hacking a bank, and practice on a fake online bank in order to learn how to stop potential hackers.

According to the Skillssoft website, "learners who prepare for exams using Skillssoft Percipio have a 92% certification pass rate." Upon high school graduation, a student with the CompTIA SECURITY+ credential has the option of beginning a career in Cybersecurity.

New Tradition—the WHHS Poet Laureate

We are an institution steeped in tradition. Most traditions don't appear overnight, but become part of our landscape after events occur that solidify a new idea or initiative. If that idea or initiative takes root, we move on to the new level.

Case in point is the inauguration of the first "Poet Laureate" of Walnut Hills High School.

The last few years the seeds of poetry have been ignited and caught fire by our English Department.

You might remember we shared an initiative started by **Jake Riordin** (now co-chair of the English Department) to bring poetry to life by engaging students with young poets—having the students write in their style, reach out to the actual poet for feedback and in many cases have the poet actually come and visit the school.

Fast forward, after seeing the effect on students, additional faculty members stepped on board and the sphere of poets and poetry began to grow. The number of students participating in poetry competitions, both written and performing increased dramatically.

Hence in thinking about our 125+2 Anniversary, where we would be celebrating the legacy we shared, we thought it only fitting that we embark on a new tradition. In the summer of 2022, the English Department selected **Nola Stowe** from the Class of 2024 to be the first WHHS Poet Laureate. Nola had already demonstrated her award winning excellence in performance poetry.

The title of Poet Laureate was first granted in England and in the 17th century and began in the United States in 1937. This new tradition honors the past with a nod to the present and future.

Nola will serve a two year period. As part of the responsibilities of her appointment, she will be engaging our younger students to get involved in poetry.

Student Body Enhancement Fund

Many of our reunion classes this year selected our Student Body Enhancement Fund as their class gift. The impact of this fund is all encompassing and the needs fluctuate every year. From planners for all 7th graders, printing of a study skills guide, paying for AP fees, to programmatic stability in music, art, theater, sports and extracurriculars from instruments, sheet music, uniforms, microphones, field trips, art supplies for photography and ceramics, upgrades in technology, entry fees for academic competitions, classroom guess speakers, the list goes on and on.

Visionary unpinning; many student projects or clubs fall in a 'gray area' when it comes to funding support, we fund the inspired! From the Robotics Team performing on the world stage to students collaborating with Children's Hospital to write, illustrate, and produce books for patients. Through support, students learn concrete steps to bring a vision to life.

New Math Resources

The WHHS Math Department asked for funding this year for two online resources, DeltaMath and Typesy. DeltaMath gives students a competitive advantage by allowing them to work math problems on their phones and other devices and receive immediate feedback and help. Typesy is an online curriculum that provides certificates upon mastery that students can include in their resumes. Feedback from students and faculty has been positive!

DeltaMath is an incredible supplemental resource for our students. It has the best problem sets I've seen thus far as well as the best examples for students to refer to in a way they can really understand. The students say great things about DeltaMath and it's an integral part of our classrooms.

Teaching Algebra 1 AA, I have students entering my classroom with a wide range of skill levels. DeltaMath is a life saver for my students and myself, especially at the beginning of the year, because it helps to reinforce fundamental skills and procedural fluency of basic skills that they are going to need in order to master the Algebra 1 standards. By assigning independent practice on DeltaMath for students to complete outside of class, I am able to spend class time doing rich tasks and engaging activities that deepen my students' conceptual understanding. I like using DeltaMath as a way to reinforce skills being taught in class. I typically give students a weekly DeltaMath assignment that they can work on any time that week. The built-in videos and examples are great for students that need the opportunity to see problems being "worked out." Delta Math is also good for reviewing topics taught in previous courses, which has been particularly important as we work to fill "pandemic gaps." I'm grateful for access to this excellent learning tool.

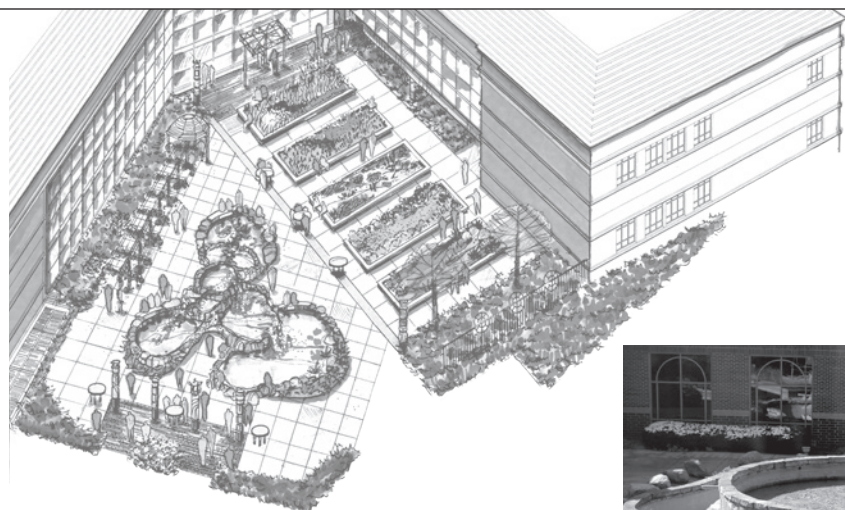

The Environmental Courtyard

The Environmental Courtyard was created in 1999 as part of the Alumni Arts and Science Building. It consists of planting beds as well as a circulating pond. Life Science classrooms open directly into the courtyard which is used as an extension of the classroom.

The beds have hosted a wetland, a bog as well as other native plants to the Ohio region. The pond has hosted a wide range of aquatic life (plants, fish and organisms). This area requires yearly maintenance which alumni funds have provided. Of course, this area had very limited use during Covid and now we are reopening it for classroom use. This year alumni funds paid for the pond to be emptied, extensively cleaned and restocked and the beds refreshed with additional plants.

Classes began using it again this spring: Environmental Science classes looked at water quality with sampling and testing as well as running data analysis, Botany classes conducted angiosperm labs as well as looked at plant interaction in the ecosystem, 7th grade science classes worked on a natural selection project and learned data

analysis, and Biology classes used it similarly taking microscopes out to look at plants and aquatic life at the cell level.

Our art department also used the space for photography, painting and drawing classes.

In the summer we grew vegetables and plants to give to the community. The year before Covid, we worked with a women’s shelter in the neighborhood to bring them fresh produce every week. As a next step, we would like to invite the neighborhood in to teach them how to grow vegetables too.

The **Class of 1972**, in honor of their 50th reunion, stepped forward to help with the next item on the wish list, which was to provide outdoor tables for the courtyard to make it easier to conduct experiments as well as record data. Several members of the class actually met with our students and faculty to see it in use.

Their fundraising was over the top, purchasing 10 durable and weather resistant tables, portable enough to move around and reconfigure if more than one class wanted to use the space at the same time.

Teachers and students were thrilled to see the tables arrive in time to actually utilize them before winter came and for the reunion class to see them in the courtyard! (see 1972 reunion recap, page 9).

Walnut Woods of Evanston Grand Opening

Most of you know there are “woods” in the front of the school bordering Sulsar, but are probably not aware it is owned by Cincinnati Parks. In the early years of WHHS it was maintained and provided a lovely vista of the school from Central Parkway. Over the years it

has been neglected, overrun with invasive species, dead trees and not usable in any sense.

Several years ago, one of our science faculty members, **Allie Mondini**, spearheaded an effort to “reclaim the woods,” clean them up, return them to their natural habitat, restore and create trails and turn this 10 acre neglected property into a healthy urban greenspace, outdoor

classroom, and publicly assessable park. Collaborations were built with the Civic Garden Center of Greater Cincinnati, Cincinnati Parks, and the Evanston Community Council. WHHS’s Bio-Eco Club, alumni, parents, and community members have contributed more than 5,600 volunteer hours to see this project move forward. This effort combined with \$40,000 in grant funds have gone into this initiative thus far.

On October 22, 2022 the official opening of the Walnut Woods of Evanston took place. The ceremony commenced with a tree planting and ended with a celebration.

We are happy to report Allie’s unfolding vision is a work in progress. Classes from all disciplines are using this outdoor classroom on a regular basis which technically is a field trip and permission slips must be completed annually.

Discovering...

Every season provides a unique learning opportunity for our students. One of our students, while taking some ant samples in the woods (he wants to become an entomologist), discovered an ant species that had never been documented in Ohio! His discovery will now be documented by OSU who is trying to catalogue all ant species in the State of Ohio. The labor aspects of taking care of the woods are obvious, but our students are also propagating native tree specimens

in our greenhouse to be given away or planted in the woods, 7th graders are involved with an ecosystem modeling project, and in the spring botany classes are learning about wildflowers. Collectively students are working on a project to create an official catalogue of all species present in the woods. In the bird family alone we have observed oriole, goldfinch and redwing black bird to name a few.

As you can imagine, this is a huge undertaking and will need sustained volunteer efforts to maintain the progress that has been made as well as to move forward. If you are interested in volunteering please contact Allie at mondina@cpsboe.k12.oh.us

More about Allie....

Allie Mondini teaches 7th grade science as well as Geology and Meteorology. This year she received the Class of 1946/Golden Apple Award which recognizes outstanding faculty both inside and outside of the classroom. Interesting, but not surprising, many of her 7th grade students go on to take her elective classes later on because of her passion for her subject. Allie creates hands-on learning experiences, connecting the content to the world around us to make it relevant. She wants her students to have a keen awareness of our planet and their responsibility as global citizens to preserve and protect it. In addition to serving as the Advisor for the Bio-Eco Club she has led an annual student trip to Hawaii to work on conservation projects. Now that Covid has abated, she is hopeful to resume this endeavor.

On the horizon, one of the alumni projects on the drawing board is an amphitheater in the woods. This venue would provide seating for 125-150 for outdoor classes of all disciplines as well as a stage, sound and lighting to be used for presentations or theater productions that our entire Walnut community could use.

FACULTY ENRICHMENT

Citizens of the World

WHHS continues as a model of classical education, honoring our roots in the past while creating relevance in global perspectives. Our horizon continues to expand in many disciplines as we feature world culture in music written in a wide range of languages from Latin to Swahili and German. History includes electives of not only AP

European History, but AP Human Geography, AP World History and Survey of African History. English classes read the classics as well as authors from around the world. World Literature is a class offering.

Modern World Language has increased their offerings to include French, German, Spanish, Russian and Chinese. What is unusual is the depth of the curriculum. Each involve an Advanced Placement component, which in Russian and Chinese has taken a few years to develop.

Coupled with all the disciplines is the notion that seeing and experiencing cultures, language, history, art and music first hand is invaluable. This is also echoed in the teaching of the classics, visiting Europe, its museums and places of history, archaeology sites gives students perspectives not found in a book.

Classes from all disciplines are using this outdoor classroom

This year we funded several members of our Modern World Language Department to attend the state conference. The **Class of 1979** helped fund upgrades to the Language Lab including new headphones and webcams, we purchased additional teaching resources for the Spanish classes and we will be awarding a limited amount of travel scholarships to our students.

Below are comments from our Modern World Language Department Chair, **Liz Owens**, regarding new global initiatives.

Dear Deb,

Thanks to the Alumni association, Yan Ping and Daniela Mazander (German teacher) attended OFLA, our state's world language conference this summer. It was the 50th anniversary of the state conference. The teachers attended various workshops and sessions regarding the best teaching practices for World Languages as well as ideas and curriculum to bring back with them to the classroom. They learned the best and current teaching methods for the world language classroom. Yan Ping said one of the best parts of the conference included attending professional development specifically to Chinese and collaborating with other Chinese teachers throughout the state.

A new initiative we advocated for our school last year was to give our students the opportunity to earn our state's Seal of Biliteracy. This proves a student's functional fluency in English and another Modern World Language. These credentials may be accepted for internships, employment and even help with language placement in college. Students must take a nationally approved assessment and score in the intermediate high range, which is equivalent to a 5 on the AP exam. They may also qualify by scoring a 4 or above on the AP tests. Only juniors and seniors can qualify. With that said 45 students in Chinese, French, German and Spanish earned the seal of biliteracy and will have that on their transcript upon graduation.

Finally, the presentation with CIEE (Council on International Educational Exchange) went very well. We were selected as a Global fellowship navigator school this year. There are only 100 chosen nationwide, so this was a competitive process. The donor gives 5.4 million each summer for merit, and merit/need based scholarships. The company promised our school \$10,000 for merit based students and prioritized our need based applicants. We now have 48 students who are in the application process to study abroad in all the five Modern World languages offered at Walnut. Students will find out in February what scholarship they receive. On average CIEE offers 60%-100% scholarships that are need based. Our department is excited to offer this opportunity to ALL students who are interested in studying abroad and make the possibility of doing so more equitable.

Once our students find out what scholarships they receive in Feb., we will have a number of the students who actually decide to study abroad and I will keep you posted. Thank you so much!

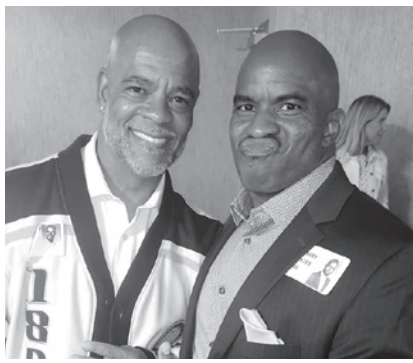

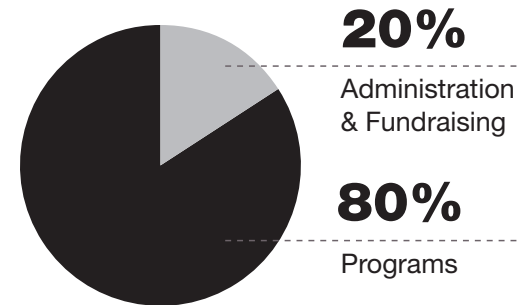

2021-2022 Scholarships

This year the WHHS Alumni Foundation awarded approximately \$400,000 of college scholarships to our seniors. We received over 150 applications and awarded 125. Eight new scholarships were established by donors in honor or memory of classmates or family members as well as a scholarship for students who wish to attend HBCU institutions. Three new scholarships are profiled below.

The Burlew Family Scholarship

Dr. Kathy Burlew and her family credit Walnut Hills with influencing the trajectory of their professional and personal lives. They established this scholarship to pay forward the benefits that a Walnut Hills education provided for them. Kathy and the late John Burlew, both from the Class of 1966, and their two daughters, Randi Dawn Burlew and Robin Burlew Vann graduated in 1994 and 2001 respectively! WHHS was a legacy they all shared and cherished. Their criteria for the scholarship is that it be awarded to an African-American student whose character and service demonstrate promise.

Priority should be given to a student with financial need and/or one enrolling in a Historically Black College or University (HBCU).

The John '59 and Jean Campbell Scholarship, in Memory of Joel Thomason '59

John and Jean established this scholarship to honor the memory of Joel Thomason a friend and classmate of John's. John reflected that "Joel Thomason '59 was a dedicated student-athlete, highly-principled, optimistic, and kind. He lived in the inner-city and graduated from DePauw University in 1963. His father was the janitor at WHHS. Joel's life was cut short by the Vietnam War." The criteria for the scholarship reflects what John admired about Joel "he or she must possess the character, perseverance, and kindness that indicate they will contribute meaningfully to their community and society, in addition to having great financial need.

The Weubbling Family Scholarship

This scholarship was established by the Wuebbling family, who has multiple ties to WHHS. Carol Wuebbling is a former beloved Latin teacher at WHHS and Don, her husband served as a member of the Parent Board for many years. Their two children, Matthew and Monica, graduated in 1995 and 1994 respectively. All feel a strong commitment to excellence in public education.

The criteria for their scholarship includes awarding two seniors, one male and one female, who have maintained a 3.0 or higher and demonstrated superior leadership qualities in various positions both inside and outside of school and plan to pursue a career in science, math or engineering. Financial need should also be taken under consideration.
