Define unknown words through context clues and the author's use of comparison, contrast and cause and effect.	 Discuss examples as they arise in readings. Do "Diction" exercises to illustrate effects of word choice and how authors clarify meaning (resource: <u>Voice Lessons</u>).
2. Analyze the relationships of pairs of words in analogical statements (e.g., synonyms and antonyms, connotation and denotation) and infer word meanings from these relationships.	 Do selected "Diction" exercises from <u>Voice Lessons</u>. Discuss antonyms and synonyms in connection with readings and with daily or specially selected vocabulary words. Do SAT analogy exercises.
3. Infer the literal and figurative meaning of words and phrases and discuss the function of figurative language, including metaphors, similes, idioms and puns.	 Do selected "Diction" exercises from <u>Voice Lessons</u>. Read aloud passages from assigned readings to infer word meanings and examine function of figurative language. Include discussion of figurative language as resource for descriptive and expository writing assignments.
4. Analyze the ways that historical events influenced the English language.	Discuss history of the English language—Old, Middle, modern—and historical events and processes that influenced development, such as Anglo-Saxon migration, Christianity and Latin, Norman invasion.
5. Use knowledge of Greek, Latin and Anglo-Saxon roots, prefixes and suffixes to understand complex words and new subject-area vocabulary (e.g., unknown words in science, mathematics and social studies).	 Do occasional vocabulary intensives on roots and prefix/suffix clusters. Consult teachers in other disciplines for subject-area lists of vocabulary used in high school classes or college-level words.
6. Determine the meanings and pronunciations of unknown words by using dictionaries, thesauruses, glossaries, technology and textual features, such as definitional footnotes or sidebars.	 Require students to learn definitions of unusual words from readings. Examine daily school-wide vocabulary words, their pronunciations and meanings. Regular quizzes on daily words. Resource: use Folger editions of Shakespeare, with facing-page vocabulary sidebars.
