#trending... Philippe Haas '04: Following his graduation from WHHS and The Kelley School of Business, Indiana University, Philippe hoped that his strength in math would lead to work in the

financial world. But, he found that this particular path was not one that inspired him or gave him the creative outlook he was hoping to find. A call from an uncle in Berlin, Germany, led to a change of direction and a learning curve in both German and men's fashion. For the next five years, Philippe learned the ins-and-outs of men's retail, from buying merchandise and sales tactics, to budgeting, forecasting and designing both shops and new collections. "One of my favorite things to do was go to the fashion showrooms where we picked out future season fabrics and designed new collections."

When the call came from his brother in November, 2015, with an invitation to join the celebration of his marriage, Philippe realized it was time to return to Cincinnati and set up his own clothing company. "I took my financial business background and what I call my real world master's degree in European fashion to write a business plan.... I quit my job working in Berlin and took the time to focus on my business contacts that I made in Europe, specifically Italy, Portugal and China. I took trips to all three places, strengthening my relations, leaned more about production and the capabilities of custom clothing shipped to the United States....I also created relationships with European fabric companies, sourced directly from their European mills, to be delivered to my factories."

Philippe Haas Bespoke Tailoring (www.PhilippeHaas.com) was launched in December, 2015 in downtown Cincinnati. His vision "is to make custom clothing for men and women who want a one-of-a-kind, European influenced, luxury product for an affordable price."

### 1. ENGINEERING

### Pilot Engineering Initiative Launched

Spearheaded by Board member **Dick Paulsen '77** last year, we began our first collaboration between WHHS Engineering students and engineers employed by WHHS alumni companies. We spent our first year identifying potential alumni companies, met with interested parties, and developed a blueprint for visits. The first visit took place this spring at Shepherd Chemical, led by **Tom Shepherd (son of John '53)**. Students were given a tour of the plant, met with a host of engineers and learned about the different facets of Shepherd. Our students were thrilled to be in an industrial setting and see their textbook knowledge translated to actual careers.

### 2. PHYSICAL HEALTH

### Fitness Center

As part of the Foundation's Capital Campaign, the WHHS Fitness Center was opened during the last phase of our campus renovation. The impact of the Fitness Center continues to expand as it provides students the opportunity for strengthening and conditioning and forming lifelong fitness habits. The Center is used by both physical education students and student athletes

### 3. SUMMER PROGRAMS

During the summer months, most high schools are quiet, with the exception of a sprinkling of athletic teams practicing or maintenance work being completed. This is not the case at Walnut Hills High School! Over the years, the WHHS Alumni Foundation

has designed, implemented and staffed a series of classes for both incoming seventh graders and students in the upper grades. The

Students took advantage of summer enrichment and tutorial programs


selections have expanded over the last few years to include enrichment classes offered by faculty members and classes for credit in Economics, Health and Government.

This past year over 160 incoming seventh graders took advantage of our Ready, Set, Go! program which introduces incoming students to English, Latin, and Math. They spend 1 hour of instructional time in each subject, meet other new students, and familiarize themselves with the campus. With sessions offered both in the morning and evening, over the course of a week the new students become acclimated to the regime of Walnut Hills.

In addition, review sessions for both Latin and Math attracted 90 students who take advantage of opportunities to start the new academic year off with refreshed memories. Art, college essays, college application boot camps and classes in Economics, Government and Health fill the hallways with students over the course of the summer.

> "This summer, I helped 160 incoming 7th graders navigate the world of 7AA English at the Ready, Set, Go! program. These nervous and eager 11- and 12-year-olds learned strategies for analyzing poetry, understanding short fiction, and organizing ideas for analytical and argumentative writing. A few students even took up my challenge to memorize Robert Frost's famous poem, "The Road Not Taken." By the end of the week, students had filled their English "toolbox" with catchy ways to begin

> > engaging with all sorts of fiction and non-fiction texts. Most importantly, the students met a ton of new friends during our turn-and-talk discussions."



4. STUDENT TRAVEL

The impact of providing students the opportunity to become immersed in the global community has expanded horizons, created awareness and opened doors on numerous continents. Many students upon their return use this experience as a springboard to become involved in global initiatives at home. Some of our students have even started clubs such as STAR (Students Together Assisting Refugees) (see related article on page 5), United for Uganda, and the Modern Abolitionists.

Ben Aufermann '17, shares his experiences from his first trip outside the United States:

"This was my first time flying in an airplane ..(and) despite how terrify it was for me, a guy with a huge fear of heights,...

the trip was entirely worth it. The sights I got to see while experiencing Inti Raymi, exploring Cusco and visiting historic sites were truly breathtaking. The time I spent doing all that, while also getting to know fellow classmates better, and while enhancing my current Spanish skill is something I will not forget. ... None of that would have been possible if the Alumni Foundation did

not help my family out with the funding. Thus, on behalf of my family, and all the other families that you helped and will help in the future: THANK YOU."

The impact of student travel changed the projectory of Savannah Tate Cuff's journey....

Savannah Tate Cuff '11, travelled the summer of her junior year to an art camp in France, with the assistance of the WHHS Alumni Foundation's Lagnappe Scholarship. That summer abroad transformed her and she has gone on to pursue a career in Fine Arts.

# CAMPUS UPDATE

### The Dedication of the Natatorium

A gathering of friends and family on a Thursday afternoon (August 25th, 2016) celebrated the dedication of the Abrahamson Natatorium. The Abrahamson family was represented by **Ira Abrahamson, '42**, **Jean Abrahamson '40**, Ira's sons Tom and Rick, Rick's wife Mandy, Ira's daughter Susan and her husband, Jeff Routh, as well as Ira's grandchildren. The dedication was held in the Natatorium and a reception in the Schott Recital Hall followed.



Alumni, parents, the WHHS swim teams, coaches and staff gathered in the viewing stands and listened to Rick speak of his father, the legacy of swimming and Ira's successful career in the field of ophthalmology. It was through the competitiveness in the pool that he was inspired to achieve many of his lifelong goals. While at Walnut Hills, his team placed 2nd in the city, won the Southern Ohio District Championship and placed 4th in the Columbus State meet in 1942. After leaving Walnut Hills on a scholarship in swimming to the University of North Carolina, Ira added the butterfly to his repertoire and helped to lead UNC to a Southern Conference Championship in both 1943 and 1944. This was followed in 1947 by becoming a charter member of the International Swimming Hall of Fame in Ft. Lauderdale, Florida.

Medical School followed and a stint in the army, where Dr. Ira performed surgeries on both adults and children to correct misaligned eyes, which left untreated after age 7 eventually causes blindness. This life-changing surgery impacted him so much that Dr. Ira developed a Vision Screening Program for children in order to detect and correct defects before they caused irreversible damage to a child's vision. The program went international through the Rotary Club, with the intent to wipe out preventable blindness in children throughout the world.

For over 30 years, Dr. Ira spent a month every year doing free eye surgery in Mexico as a way to share his skills with patients with little access to medical care.

In 1995, Dr. Ira founded the Abrahamson Pediatric Eye Institute at Cincinnati's Children Hospital, one of the leading centers serving medical and surgical Children's eye care in the country. Recently Dr. Ira established the Abrahamson Endowed Chair of Pediatric Ophthalmology linking Children's Hospital with Cincinnati's College of Medicine.

As Rick finished his talk, he said, "It is fitting, then, that my dad is back here today at his alma mater, Walnut Hills High School, where his life was set into motion.....The Abrahamson Family Natatorium thus honors a family of graduates from this outstanding school, and it is a phenomenal facility that is sure to benefit many students athletes for years to come."

A plaque, which lists the generous gifts made by Ira '42, Linda Aloe '56, Margaret Abrahamson Halle '39, and Jean '40, has been installed outside the door leading to the Natatorium.

### Dedication of the Tony Trabert '48 Tennis Complex

On a cloudless, hot Sunday afternoon (September 25th, 2016), a crowd came to the Tony Trabert '48 Tennis Complex to celebrate both the honoree and the return of tennis to the campus of Walnut Hills High School. Linked by phone, those present



were able to hear Tony express in his clear, humble voice, his pride in his alma mater and the pleasure of seeing this dream become a reality - the six tennis courts completed and in use by both the students and the community.

Speakers included Mary Ronan, Superintendent of Cincinnati Public Schools, discussing the successful partnership between CPS and WHHS Alumni Foundation; Dick Weiland '47, who shared his memories of playing with Tony; Tom Donnelly, WHHS Athletic Director, discussing the current tennis teams' ability to use the courts so close to campus; and Brian Leshner '70, representing Activities Beyond the Classroom, whose community programs are using the courts for tennis lessons.

The ribbon cutting was followed by the Alumni Tennis Challenge where alumni play the current WHHS Varsity team. A cookout, with chefs from Dads Gone Nuts, and food provided by the WHHS Alumni Foundation, culminated the event.

A plaque, with Tony's picture and a description of his tennis career, has been installed and placed outside the courts. Next time you are on campus, take a few minutes to stop by and read the extraordinary accomplishments of this talented athlete who chose tennis over basketball and gave the world a standard of excellence in both playing a demanding sport and how he chose to live his life in the public eye.

### William Kern, '54

Bill Kern, class of 1954, and graduate of Miami University, passed away unexpectedly May 10th, 2016, while undergoing bypass surgery in Cincinnati. Retired from a career in marketing, sales, and strategic planning from Marion Merrell Dow, Bill, at the request of the LSDMC in the late 90's, used his talents and experience to create the Long Range Plan




for the school. He went on to serve in the accreditation progress, ultimately chairing the AdvancEd Team here on campus this last February. Joining the WHHS Alumni Foundation Board of Trustees in 2004, his smile and his enthusiasm for all things Walnut was a wonderful example of the unfailing and exuberant energy that defined his life. "When Bill Kern came knocking, everyone knew that they were going to hear about the accomplishments of Walnut Hills High School at some point in the conversation. He was a very, very dear man and the most devoted friend that our school could ever have", expressed Jeff Brokamp '78, Principal, in emails to the staff following news of Bill's death.

The dual relationship Bill had with Walnut Hills and Miami University led to the forming of a collaboration of liberal arts colleges and high schools like us throughout the nation. An annual conference was established where ideas, challenges and options were forged.

Bill was also responsible for organizing our very successful Junior Achievement program, recruiting alums to return to the classroom, this time as mentors, for the 7th and 8th grade program which now impacts every social studies classroom in both grades. He loved the Fine Arts and frequently would be seen with his wife, Pat, at theatre and music performances throughout the year. Bill and Pat sponsored performances from The Cincinnati Shakespeare Company at Walnut Hills for several seasons. He was also very active in the Boy Scouts, devoting 42 years to the organization, along with other civic groups in the Cincinnati area.

He leaves a legacy of generosity and service to the school, a rather large set of footprints for others to follow.


### Authors, Authors....

Community College in Lowell, Massachusetts. Her books can be found on Amazon.





**Dr. Thomas Gold '66**, was in town for his reunion. He initially decided to stay an extra few days after the reunion, to spend the day talking with students about China. He visited two history classes (one AP and one seventh grade) and a level 3 Chinese class. original traveling










### Class of 1976 — 40th Reunion

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
